> said-" You have sold me, but the cathedral shall never be built, and your name shall never be known;" and with an effervescence of tire he fizzelled into thin air; but the most singular and true part of the tale is this-no man knows the name of the architect that built the Cologne Cathedral, and it is not finished, and I think never will. The Cathedrals of Europe, like the round towers of Ireland, had their origin in a peculiar religion. Separate them from that religion, and they become mere monuments of art. The leading idea of Grecian architecture is proportion, and the beauty which arises out of proportion. 'It' is beautiful, therefore, independent of ornament. The idea of the ornaments, therefore, which have been added is grace; but proportion and grace are immortal. Therefore, the elements of the Greek architecture are designed to be perpetuated. It is the architecture of a free, enlightened and protected people. It is, it self, a symbol of intellectual development-of human progress. The leading idea of Gothic architecture is solidity and strength. It is the architecture for fortification and defence upon rocky and irregular heights, with anrequired for the rectangular symmetrical Grecian structure.
