KILLED BY LIGHTNING.—During the storm that occurred on Tuesday night, 20th inst., Miss Eliza Fenton, daughter of Mr. No. 1, Fenton of Alderburgh, was instantly killed. She and two other girls—her sister and a Miss Robinson—were sitting beside the fire—the rest having retired before they came in. The electric spark struck the unbroken window, leaped over the fire, causing instant death and slightly injuring her companions. It afterwards passed through the floor, killing a dog under the house. Another portion ran along the upper floor, then passed out on the side of the house. Miss Fenton was at her home in Detroit a week where she had been staying with her sister. The afflicted family have lost a beloved member, and she will long be missed by her young associates.—*St. Thomas Journal.*

A TRAGEDY IS INDIANA.—The Indianapolis Herald gives the following account of a fatal tragedy which recently took place in Bedford, Indiana. A Professor Evans had betrayed the daughter of Dr. Newlands, and after some time the daughter had confessed her condition to her father, revealing at the same time the author of her dishonor. The horrified father armed himself with a pistol and went to see Dr. Evans on the street about him. Evans fled to the earth and began to implore Newland to spare him, but the latter plunged his long knife into the neck of his victim almost severing the head from the body, and then stabbed him repeatedly. Prof. Evans was a minister of the church, and though he held only a position of considerable eminence, he was once a Professor in the Northwestern Christian University. This was not his only offence of the kind.

ON Friday last the inhabitants of Bismarck held a public meeting in the Court House, St. Paul, to consider what steps were to be taken. It was unanimously resolved to place at the disposal of the Government the services and resources of the people of Bismarck, in defending the Province from Fenian invasion; and to offer all their horses, vehicles, and implements necessary for the conveyance of reinforcements, landed at Father Point, to the railway at Riviere du Loup. An address founded on these resolutions, to be presented to the Governor General, contains the important, and coming from the mouth of such a body, the following:—Father Point affords a safe and easy landing place at all seasons of the year, and in all weathers. This loyal movement of the men of Bismarck will be the means of attracting attention to Father Point as a Canadian winter port.

The "Czar Ship" LAZARUS.—Mr. Whine's cigar ship has been launched in England. It is announced that she is intended for a private yacht, to be attached to the Imperial Yacht Club. She is christened the *Rose Winans*. In a few weeks she will be ready, and will be important and interesting sailing vessel. Some peculiarities of her construction are thus described by the London *Times*:—" Beneath the vessel, in place of a keel, is a broad band of the best Lowermow iron, an inch thick, by three feet wide. This is made to project in case of taking the vessel with her from her peculiar form it would be easy to beach her on any emergency. Inside this is an iron floor covered with wood, which runs from end to end of the vessel, and forms, in fact, her deck. The iron floor amidships is only about six feet from the lowest part of the under, so that overhead there is a tolerably roomy cabin, much resembling in shape a small railway tunnel. The upper and only outer deck is one hundred and thirty feet long by ten and a half wide. The lower deck is built for that length, so we may call a square flat-topped wooden cover on the upper side of the cylinder. For all the world, she seems like the back of a whale that's been decked and furnished, rather than any ship meant to navigate the ocean."
