On the other hand, some of the lumber manufacturers on this side own timber lands and mills on the British side, and in order to get their lumber to market would have to bring it to this side and pay duty on it. Heretofore, lumber cut on either side was manufactured on whichever side best suited the convenience of the owner, and went into any market that paid best, without let or

Success of FREE LABOR IN AREANSAS .- General Sprague, Assistant Commissioner of the Freedmen's Bureau in the State of Arkansas, in his report for February, says, the planters with few exceptions, report that the freedmen are working to their entire satisfaction; but many still entertain fears that at some critical period these laborers will leave them, and subect them to heavy loss. Occasionally a laborer leaves his employer, to whom he is under contract, without cause, on which the employer makes a demand upon the nearest Superintendent to have the delinquent pursued and returned to him. This has been steadily refused; but the employers are authorized to pursue the freedmen thus violating their contracts, and stop the payment of their wages wherever they engage to labor. This system works well. The negro tires of working where he receives no pay, and often returns to his employer impressed with the necessity of fulfilling his contract, and realizing that he is sn' ject to and protected by laws founded on
