EDUCATION IN ENGLAND.

TORQUAY, DEVONSHIRE. MR. BLACKMAN, AND HIS SISTER, MISS BENNETT, receive for board and education a limited number of young ladies, to whose moral and religious training, on Church of England principles, they devote their utmost attention. The domestic arrangements of the establishment are under the personal superintendence of Mrs. BLACKMAN (a widow) of some time, and her peculiarly well adapted to promote the comfort and happiness of those entrusted to her care. The number of Torquay is too well known to medical practitioners in all parts of the world to require comment.

The course of instruction comprises a thorough English education, with French.
