THE QUEEN v. JOHN J. LEWIS, Esq.

The Queen v. Arthur Owens, for assault on Margaret Williams. The Crown Attorney opened the case in a brief address, showing the nature of the case to the jury.

Margaret Williams being sworn, gave substantially the same evidence as she gave at the previous trial, though at the present trial she deposed to let it be known that she was drunk when she visited Owens shop, she showed the commission on her face, and stated her body was bruised all over.

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PRESIDENT JOHNSON'S TOUR

His Reception at Niagara Falls. (Special from the Leader's Correspondent.)

The reception of President Johnson and the American gentleman who are now accompanying him, was the most brilliant and successful of any of the kind.

The party arrived by special train over the New York Central railroad at four o'clock in the afternoon. The weather having been so beautiful, the number of persons on the streets and about the hotels, anxious to see the distinguished President and his party, was very large.

The remainder of the party had not arrived in the time and a good opportunity was afforded to see President Johnson and his Secretary of State. Whoever had seen portraits of them had no difficulty in recognizing them.

The party was then taken to the Hotel de Ville, where the President and his party were to remain during their stay in Ottawa.
