THEREAS, THE 3rd SECTION OF the Act passed in the 29th and 30th years of Her Majesty's Reign, intituled: "An Act," to amend the Acts respecting Duties of Customs, and the Tariff of Duties payable under them," enacts that "upon, from and after the FIRST day of OCact directly upon the roots of the hair, supplying required nourishment, and TOBER in the present year," Sparkling Wine of all kinds, in bottles, when accompanied by a certificate of growth, shall be entitled to entry at \$3.00 per natural color and beauty of growth, shall be entitled to entry at \$3.00 per dozen quart bottles and \$1.50 per dozen pint bottles. 
