These Indians are located near the headwaters of Milk River. They have, according to last year's distribution, 6-22 of the goods sent. This year, however, the goods designed for them are properly baled and marked, as well as the bales and boxes for the other tribes. The balance of the Blood Indians are with the upper Piegans in the "Bull Run" to harness, for \$2,000, mile heats,


