NEWS-ITEMS.

The paper-burial expenses of Nashville for the last three months were \$3,606.50. About two million doses of eggs are annually brought from Maine to Boston.

A herd of blooded cattle was recently sold in England for \$10,000, an average of \$330 per head. It is rumored that Bialor, the great Italian tragedienne, will visit Montreal during the coming winter.

Three young lads were recently drowned at Sycote, in the county of Meaganic, while playing on some saw logs in the Becancour. About 3,000 Sabbath school children celebrated the Centenary of American Methodism in New Haven, Conn., on Thursday.

Nine hundred dead bodies were picked up in the streets of Balme, India, in one morning.—Cause: Famine. The Flora Observer says the rot has destroyed nearly half the potatoes in the neighboring townships.

In Alabama, the mulberry grows luxuriantly, and attention is being given to the production of silk. There will be a general election, it is believed, in Prince Edward Island, towards the end of November.

A train on the Memphis and Charleston Railroad ran through a trestle and injured forty persons. The oil well struck at Torre Hante is reported to flow ten barrels per hour of oil valued at \$20 per barrel.

The first Canadian mail steamer for Portland and New York will be the Hibernian. She will leave Liverpool on the 8th November. One of the oldest newspapers in the world, the Postscript, which was established in 1616, has just disappeared—suppressed by Bismarck.

Large quantities of government stores are being almost daily received at Kingston, and it is again rising in importance as a naval station. The steamship Pennsylvania may soon be expected in the St. Lawrence river with the 100th Royal Canadian Regiment, as she now has been 12 to 14 days out.

The Colt Arms Manufacturing Company has received an order for the production of one hundred revolving cannon at a cost of \$100,000. By whom given is not stated. The Chicago Driving Park is to be abandoned, the buildings torn down and horse racing in Chicago. All this in consequence of the McKeever murder.

The Lowell "mill girls" have, to the number of several hundreds, adopted the Bloomer costume, as more comfortable while at their work than the old style. On Sunday, one of the nine bells to be erected in the tower of St. Michael's Cathedral, Toronto, was consecrated by Bishop Lynch, with imposing ceremonies.

Two fishing boats from Michigan were lately wrecked on the Canada shore, near Point Frank. Five men perished by the accident—all former residents of Canada. George Peabody has given \$150,000 to Harvard University as a fund with which to build and maintain a museum and Professorship of American Archeology and Ethnology.

The Oil Springs, C. W. Chronicle says that the well owned by Mr. Thomas, commenced pumping on Monday morning, 15th inst., and is yielding from 45 to 50 barrels a day. Captain Hoiler, the author of the gratifyingly written letters in the Times, from the Prussian headquarters during the recent German contest, is now writing a book called the "Seven Weeks' War."

Nearly all the Roman Catholic Bishops in the Province have issued Pastoral Letters in the faithful of their dioceses calling upon them to extend a helping hand towards the Quebec sufferers. The detectives have been at work in Boston hunting up dishonesty among leather dealers, two of whom have contributed \$4,000 and \$60,000 each rather than have their doings made public.
