but he has to a very large extent the confidence of his friends, which is in itself a source of strength, and we, who do not possess his political talents, are bound to add that he largely deserves it. It is the one man in the ministry upon whose advice the head of the government could rely in case of emergency, for courage, coolness, and above all, for some common sense. We shall think it a real misfortune, should Mr. Macdonald at this moment, if he should leave Canada, that he should be called upon to fill the place of the man who has so long and so ably served the country.

Considering the virulence with which the Attorney General West has been assailing the foregoing remarks from the leading Opposition organ in Canada East cannot but be taken as a great compliment. Though not intended to be a most conclusive answer, nor a final independent source, to the trumpet accusations of the organ of the ex-President of the Council, and following as it does, on the heels of the successful demonstrations in favor of the Delegates, it is gratifying to Mr. Macdonald, as showing that he still enjoys not only the confidence of his friends, but the respect of his opponents, or at least of their possible efficient enemy to the expression of public opinion.

But the Herald underrated the importance of the mission of the Delegates. The qualities for which our contemporary gives Mr. Macdonald credit and praise, all "sound common sense," are just those required to bring the negotiations in England to a successful issue. The chief in the affairs of the Province must not be determined not in Canada but at the colonial office, and by the Imperial Parliament; and it ought to be the largest experience in the Government should be there fully represented; as well as the several sections of the country and classes of our population. These qualities have been the considerations which have led the Delegates to resolve upon the sending of the leading Members both from Upper and Lower Canada, as well as Mr. Hall, so that in the future there may be no cause for complaint on the part of any class or section. It can be said that the fact of the Quebec Resolutions having settled the terms of Confederation, in so far as the opinion of this country is concerned, ought to have dispensed with the necessity of such a formidable delegation as has been named; for the most that can be said on behalf of these resolutions, is that they give an outline of the general principles, and set the limits to some of the details; but all these must pass the sanction of the Imperial Government and be harmonized with the views of the representatives of the Maritime Provinces, who are not pledged to the same extent as the Canadian Delegates. It is clear, therefore, that our representatives in England will have many things to attend to, and that the "courage, coolness, and above all the sound common sense" of the ATTORNEY GENERAL WEST, are just in the position to be exercised to the greatest advantage for the benefit of the country.

And the Herald also, we think, exaggerates the probabilities of danger to the Province from the temporary absence of many Ministers. It overlooks the fact that even should an extraordinary emergency arise, the absent members of the Cabinet will be within twenty-four hours call of the Administrator; that the most ample preparation has been made in advance, in view of the necessity of the absence of Ministers, which is a thing that has long been known; that Mr. MICHAEL is already familiar with the administration of affairs, and would even if Ministers were here, have the supreme direction of military matters, which are bound to believe would be the chief items of consideration in the face of any extraordinary emergency; within the pale of possibility, during the next three months; and that he is seconded by several Ministers who have long shared in the Government of the country, and who to say the least, are abundantly able to direct the ordinary administration of affairs during the brief season of the Legislative recess.
