



And whereas a contagious disease or epidemic affecting cattle prevails in many parts of Europe, and is increasing and extending its ravages, and whereas it is expedient, in order to prevent the introduction of the same into this Province, that the improvement in the introduction by sea of certain animals, and articles from depressed humors, or impure blood. The mostimportation by sea of certain animals and articles should be prohibited—
