Sheriff Jarvis of Toronto has received offi-
cial notice of the results of the Fenians until
the 13th of March.

It will be seen by an article copied else-
where, from a London (England) paper that
Messrs. Macdonald and Langton, at-
tended a meeting of the Quebec Fire Relief
Committee at the great metropolis on the
22nd ult.

LORD MONCK left Montreal yesterday after-
noon at three o'clock, en route for New York,
where he will embark on the Scotia, which
sails for England to-morrow. Lieutenant-
General Sir J. J. Michel was sworn in
as Administrator of the Government yester-
day.

The Leader says: "We recently published
a despatch on the authority of an Ottawa
paper, stating that our Government, in the
resolution appointing the delegates to Eng-
land, declared that the delegation should
vote by Provinces; Upper Canada having
one vote, and Lower Canada another." Either
contemporary or his correspondent
made a mistake. The "Ottawa paper,"
which alluded to the mode of voting at the
London Conference—the Times—did not
say that "our Government" had so decided,
but that "by the resolution appointing
the delegates from the Maritime Provinces,"
it was provided that the vote should be taken
as above-stated. It will thus be seen that
our Government had merely to acquiesce in
the decision arrived at by the sister Provinces,
but as the mode of voting is the same as that
followed at the Quebec Conference, as well
as the obviously proper one under the
circumstances, it is not to be supposed
that any of the parties concerned
would object to it. Though the latitude
allowed to the Delegates from the Lower
Provinces, may afford them an opportunity
of opposing the provisions of the Quebec
scheme, to which our delegates are com-
mitted, there is, as the Leader justly re-
marks, "no necessary conflict of interests or
opinion to divide" them; but on the con-
trary, every reason to suppose that the re-
presentatives of the Maritime Provinces, re-
cognising the fairness of the resolutions
adopted at the Quebec Conference, will
readily assent to them as the groundwork of
the Confederate Constitution. As to the part
which the Imperial Government may have to
take in assisting the Conference to an am-
icable conclusion of any points of difference
that may arise, there need be no fear that in-
justice will be done to Canada, for the Que-
bec scheme, by which this Province has so
emphatically declared its desire to abide, has
already been favorably pronounced upon by
the Colonial office, and we have a right to
expect that the influence of Her Majesty's
Ministers will be directed towards giving
effect to the provisions therein laid down.

A teacher at Irvington, N. J., has been
arrested and bound over for examination, on
a charge of severely whipping a pupil on the
12th of November as to occasion his death.

Whilst Fenians are on the move in Amer-
ica, and Fenian emissaries are endeavouring
to excite the Irish Roman Catholic population
in Ireland to acts of open rebellion against British rule, under the pretence of
thereby effecting the regeneration of Ireland, a voice from the antipodes has lately been
heard in that country—even in the very town
of "sweet Tipperary"—proclaiming to those
who love to call themselves "hereditary
bondsmen" the true means by which those
"who would be free" must "strike the
blow." The circumstances under which
this voice has been heard, and the sentiments
which it uttered are worthy of some passing
notice at the present moment, as announcing
a means of regeneration for the ills of Ireland
far more effective than Fenian rifles and
Fenian rambunctious can supply.

The Honorable John O'Shaughnessy, late
prime minister of one of our Australian
Colonies, has returned from Melbourne for
the purpose of visiting his friends in the county
of Tipperary, of which place he is a native, and
as our readers are no doubt aware, is a
Roman Catholic. He appears to have been
a man, even in early years, of some shrewd
common sense, and though, as he says there
were quite a number of signatures, calling upon
Messrs. Geo. Hay, C. T. Bate, and N. Sparks,
to allow themselves to be placed in nomination
for this ward. We were also informed that
in that case of these gentlemen accepting the
nomination, that Mr. McCormick one of the old
representatives would retire.
