We have already given the details of Great Atlantic Yacht Race between the Henrietta, Vesta and Fleetwing, which started from Sandy Hook for the west end of the Isle of Wight, yesterday at 1 o'clock, p.m. In addition we now give the following articles and sailing directions agreed upon by the parties interested in the race.

Original Articles of Agreement.

NEW YORK, Oct. 27, 1866.
