1866. Ere three times reach our readers, thousands of years will have elapsed. The deal year, in dark or bright, as the change of events shall have passed before the vision of the busy series. From the notes of the annals its occurrences will have been transcribed and commented upon, and the best or the worst that may be said will be placed upon the record with their lessons, or their warnings, set forth according to the fancy of the writer. Will 1866 stand forth as an annus mirabilis in the long history of the year? We think it will.

Though in very many of its features, 1866 will pass along the stream of time, like many of the years that have gone before it, it will stand forth in some particulars as a wonderful year. In its own special history, but which will be a part of the general history of the progress of all time to come. Every year leaves its legacy to its successor, and 1866 has left one which, in many respects, is unrivalled in the past, and perhaps for a long time will stand unequalled in the future. Not only in some things accomplished, but in many unaccomplished, there is a portentous bequest to the coming year, the value and the consequences of which it is impossible to estimate.

The records of the past twenty years have made men's minds strangely familiar with wars and revolutions. But never in all these twenty years was the map of Europe so suddenly 'revised' as by the sharp and decisive struggle which last summer convulsed the German nation, and ended in a few weeks with the complete triumph of the Prussian arms, the humiliation of Austria, the extinction of several petty kingdoms, and the accession of Venice to the Kingdom of Italy. These sudden, and in many ways unexpected events, have entirely unhealed the old balance of power in Europe, and created a feeling as to the future, in which many and doubtful issues are involved. Among these may be noted the Cretan insurrection, commenced in anticipation of advantages which the German war would throw in the way of the insurgents, and prosecuted with astonishing vigor against the effective government of the Turk, which is now left apparently by the powers of Europe to fall a prey to its own weakness. At all events the new balance of power, or the want of balance as a sure guarantee that the Crimean war of the last decade will never be repeated by France and England for the preservation of the 'sick man' at Constantinople. His fate is to be the future with new chances, the character of which it is hard to define unless that happily the Crescent must disappear. Another of the doubtful issues intimately associated by the Austro-Prussian war is the question of the temporal power of the Pope. What will be the future relations of the Kingdom of Italy with the Roman government? And again we might ask what will be the bearing of the Italian Revolutionists of the Mazzini school towards the government of Victor Emmanuel? And the agitations and threatened uprisings in Spain, sensibly affected by the same brief, but important war, - whether will they lead? And the triumph of the heroic gun, the improvement of weapons of destruction, the re-organization of the army in France, the new and improved system of recruiting in Great Britain, the mania of invention in gunnery, - what do all these things portend? Surely 1866 has left a legacy of many grave uncertainties.

The year that is past indeed a great deal and yet very little for our neighbours across the lines. A great deal in that it has shown as unexampled strength in material resources, a wealth of money, of trade, commerce, individual energy and national life that is surprising beyond measure. Very little in that the great problem of reconciling the distracted sections of the Union the sharp lines of divergence have only been brought the more clearly into view. The sore which festered at the heart of the Republic has grown with the year and descends into 1867, with increased virulence. How reconstruction is to be effected, is still in the future; and their neighbors on the other side of the Rio Grande, the Mexicans, have had a year of anarchy, petty war, and internal strife, without the extinction of a single element of discord. They plunge into the new year with a few streaks of light in their dark horizon, it is true, but no man can tell which of them will turn into the open effulgence of day. We may hope, however, that they are approaching the end of their troubles.

The triumph of the year, however, - the most enduring monument of its distinction - lies beyond the horizon of the ocean, far beyond the distracting influences of the storms of wind or weather, or the no less violent upheavals of political systems. The laying of the ATLANTIC CABLE, and the bringing up of the light one of a former year, are the great events of a practically significant character which distinguish 1866, beyond its companions on the scroll of time, and will exercise the most enduring influence upon the future of the world for all ages. Science has shown its triumph in many other ways, and invention and discovery have only been limited and successful; but space will only permit us to notice the Atlantic Cable as the chief triumph of applied knowledge for which the death year will be forever memorable.

But 1866 has not only been a year of war, and the upbuilding of kingdoms, a year of progress in art and practical science. It has been a year of the flood, as witness the great inundation of Portland, Quebec, New York, &c.; the inundations in France and England; a year of sorrow and pestilence, for wars, and the destruction of kingdoms surely bring their sorrows, but perhaps than their triumphs; fires, and inundations, and railroad accidents, and colliery explosions, and the fell ravages of that dreadful of all diseases - the cholera - who they bring in their train's terrible sum of human misery which no man can estimate?
