I flatter myself I know something of flax, having been brought up in Ulster, in Ireland, and having, myselt, grown it rather per foot, and carries a surplus of \$36,0 largely on my own farms there. I think a crop of flax here would compare favorably, both as to quantity and quality with any in the old country; doubtless, toe, the application of guano in small quantities would add consider

ably to the length and weight of our flax and crop, and as the expense of labor is likely to be greatly diminished by the introduction of manufacture this valuable crop. Give us a railway, and we can turn this crop to the best account. Farmers will find flax a lucrative addition to their other crops, not only from the return it will yield, but also from its en-couraging clean husbandry, and being death to the weevil in any soil where it grows.
