We merely desired to point out that the gentleman, who, on the 12th of December, telegraphed to the Montreal Transcript on "reliable information" that a majority of the London Conference was opposed to Ottawa, and would prefer Montreal, or even Quebec, and that Dr. Tupper would bring up the question, was not the same gentleman who, in the News, stigmatized as "utterly false" the despatch to the N. Y. World on the 11th of this month—declaring that the Conference had removed the capital to Quebec.

That the Albion should have been carried away by the un-British doctrine propounded by the handful of English who oppose the scheme here, on the ground that it should first be submitted to a vote of the people, passes our comprehension. If we except the money-by-laws in local municipalities, and a few nearly obsolete statutory provisions for prohibiting the sale of intoxicating liquors, also taking effect through municipal agency, a reference to the decision of the popular vote on any measure of legislation is totally unknown to our political system, and has never heretofore been resorted to, in regard of any of the successive steps in the progress of the colony towards self-government, since it first became a dependency of the British Crown to the present day. The decision of the provincial legislature constitutionally convened is the only legal expression of the popular voice on political questions, and that the Albion cannot deny has been given with an emphasis, both in Canada and the maritime provinces, which ought to place the matter beyond a doubt. And if, as the Albion alleges, the scheme elaborated by the ablest statesmen in all the colonies is a "crude" one, does he think it would be refuted by being submitted to the revising action of the people of "all the Provinces interested"? On the contrary no more effective mode could be devised to render it practically inoperative; conceding that the whole people of each colony were favorable to union, the probability of their agreement upon "all the details" would imply a degree of unanimity which we think it would be absurd to expect. Even our democratic neighbors, the breathing of whose political atmosphere appears to have perverted the Albion, have never gone beyond "submitting" a definite proposal to the "free" or "ray" of the sovereign people; and who follow the British model, are not accustomed to see the functions of legislation exercised by the people, except through their constitutionally chosen representatives.

The British North American Delegation, who have been in session for the past three weeks, have now settled the revision of the Quebec scheme in a memorandum which has received the unanimous assent of all the provinces represented. This document has been forwarded to Lord Carnarvon for consideration, who, we understand, give instructions that a draft bill be prepared forthwith on the basis of the memorandum, so that it may be in readiness to be submitted to Parliament as soon after its reassembling on the 25th of next month as practicable. Newfoundland and Prince Edward Island, having not yet decided to come into the Confederation, the Quebec scheme as regards these islands is modified; but with this exception, and the necessary provisions made for the North-west Territory, and British Columbia, the resolutions agreed upon in October, 1864, at the Quebec Conference, remains pretty much the same.

The change is neither "radical" nor "organic." It is not radical in that it does not remove any of the existing elements in our machinery of government. It is not "organic" in that it does not substitute a new system, nor properly speaking a new element, in our existing system. It is merely a change in the direction of consolidation; in the application of the same principles to a larger area; or in the administration of the same mode of general government with a decreased number of administrators; and a division of labor between the local and the general governments as has previously existed between the municipal and provincial systems, with this difference, that the local governments will still retain the functions of the provincial governments in matters of a provincial, as distinguished from a general character. The change, therefore, instead of being "radical and organic," is merely one of enlargement, of development and developing growth, which as the Albion will no doubt recognize to see will soon make "British America" the second nation on this continent. "If not the first," as he hopefully predicts.
