INDUSTRIAL PARTNERSHIPS.

In his last letter to the New York Tribur Tom Hughes, its London corresponden speaks of the contest that is now going on between labor and capital, and speculates as to the issues which will grow out of it. He proceeds :- " These same questions and problems meet you, no doubt, and you have to fight the same battle, but your death struggle of our time has been on another field. But think for a moment of the stress which would be upon you if you had no forests, no Western virgin land, and if the whole of your people were suddenly compressed within the area of a couple of States? That is the nearest approach you can make to our English standpoint, and then the thousand withes which bind the limbs of an old country have to be taken into The hall was decorated in a most appropri- the account. An established church, an old and powerful aristocracy, the venerable institutions and traditions which have grown through 1,000 years, and hedge us in, in our law courts, our municipal institutions, our universities, our social system, have great power and strength in many ways for upholding our national life such as we English have made it,
