W. Taylor of St. Minnesota, who was appointed by the United States Government in 1861, as a special agent, to report on the commercial relations "between the United States and the Districts of Central British America, extending from Canada the Rocky Mountains." His reports have recently come into my hands, and they afford such valuable information as to the fertility and productive capabilities of the territory in question, that I am tempted to revert to the
