"THE BRITISH NORTH AMERICA ACT" has come law. A cable despatch from the Hon, the PROVINCIAL SECRETARY to the Hon. the President of the Council, reached the capital at a late hour on Friday evening, announcing that the Confederation Bill had received the Royal sanction, with the additional very gratifying intelligence that the Intercolonial Railway Loan Guarantee Bill of Commons, by a very large majority.

The issue of Her Majesty's proclamation is all that is now required to constitute the new and enlarged dominion of CANADA:

The nineteenth section provides that "the Parliament of Canada shall be called together not later than six months after the " Union;" and the 81st section provides that the Local Legislatures of Ontario and Quebec shall also be called together not later than six months after the Union.

It will be seen that the Act gives considerinto effect; so much so that for any thing to the contrary therein contained the Federal Parliament need not be convoked at all during the present year. It is not to be supposed, however, that any delay which can be avoided will be incurred. A RUSSO-AMERICAN TREATY. RUSSIAN AMERICA CEDED TO THE UNITED STATES.

Washington, March'30 .- The President be

session a treaty with Russia, by which that power surrenders to the United States its sovereignty over all of Russian America and the adjacent islands; it especially includes the strip four hundred miles long, which extends down the coast, thus excluding British America from the ocean. The treaty was laid on the table, and will be taken up next week. The cession excites intense interest, and u-parties regard it as significant of Russian policy in view of impending European' complications on the Eastern question. Russia cedes her American territery for the reasons that induced Napoleon to sell Louisiana. In the event of a war Russia would probably lose this territory, and by munication with these places will be con parting with it the Czar secures the friendshi of our Government. The English representative is deeply chagrined, and it is said that Sir Frederick Bruce will telegraph to Earl Derby for instructions to protest against its acceptance by our Government.
