ANNEXATION OF CANADA.

For over twelve years Mr. Seward, in a series of lectures from Canada, predicted precisely what was then the current opinion, that the annexation of Canada to the United States, but would eventually bring about a consolidation of all the British Provinces, which would grow into a population, rich, and powerful, independent nation, and that it would have the advantage of the United States, but would become one of their most reliable and useful allies.

We think that current events tend to confirm his prediction. There is no doubt that this new Confederation will become independent of Great Britain whenever it chooses to do so, and as long as we continue to bear the same animosity to the United States, we cannot force the time when we shall be able to do so.

Some recent experience of the Times' mode of making citations leads us to suggest the account it gives of Mr. Seward's opinions 'ten or twelve years ago,' especially as it does not accord with our recollection. Now, we venture to assert, although we cannot, at this moment, lay our hands upon the proof, that Mr. Seward, in the most emphatic and unambiguous terms, expressed the opinion that we should sooner include all British America within our confederacy, than we should undertake to say positively whether or not we should include the Labrador letters or in any of his stump speeches; but with regard to the fact, we are certainly not mistaken.
