THE NEW FRENCH CANNON

The Berlin correspondent of the London

Times writes on the 1st inst, : " If one-half we learn about the new infantry cannon of the French be true, it is the most formidable wedpon ever invented, and will go far to render war impossible. He saw the gun at work in London as tarly as 1849, when a specimen called a two-pounder discharged 300 balls in a minute; while another a 12-pounder, threw from 50 to 60.
