Taoy, N. Y., May 27, 1867. For several years the iron laborers of Troy. as well as elsewhere, have been in a chronic state of discontent owing to the various causes growing out of our labor system. The Trades' Unions furnishes no remedy, though they did help to elevate the laborer. Last year, July 16th, a society was formed under the name of "The Co-operative Iron Founders of Troy," m., and 6 p.m. from St. Michael's until Easter. with 48 members. They had a capital of \$25,000, the result of their own carnings. The shares are \$100 each.
