

## COUNTY OF RUSSELL.

The Free and Independent Electors of the County of Russell:

GENTLEMEN.—Having been solicited by many influential friends in the County to allow myself to be nominated for the representation of Russell in the Legislative Assembly of Ontario, and though at first I hesitated in accepting the call, the urgent appeals from all quarters of the County have at length persuaded me to consent to accept a nomination.

I beg briefly to say that being only a young man in business my time is valuable to my personal interest, and I cannot afford to take money out of my business to spend it in an election contest. But if the people will put their own shoulders to the wheel, and help to return me, I will sink my personal interests, and work for the good of the County, if elected; but I will on no account agree to assist in corrupting the electors by any practices that would tend to demoralize them. I would much rather strive to elevate them, and impress them with their duty to our common country, as patriots and freemen, to make their exercise of the franchise a sacred trust, to be used conscientiously for our country's good.

If elected I shall support the Government as at present constituted, believing that as both parties coalesced to carry Confederation, they should both be represented in the Ministry.

I believe there are reforms required in the working of some of the Departments, especially the Crown Lands Department, and very likely the Government will introduce measures for a change in its management. In this regard I shall strongly advocate the free granting of Crown Lands to actual settlers; and the enactment of such measures would frustrate the operations of speculators in locking up lands against settlement.

The great lumbering interest of the Ottawa Valley shall also receive my best consideration for its due encouragement; and I will strenuously oppose any scheme of Local improvement from the public funds, which would tend to divert the trade of the Western portion of the Province, or of the Northwest Territories, into American channels, to the detriment of the interests of the Ottawa Valley and the St. Lawrence routes. In case of antagonism between the Ottawa, and Georgian Bay, and the Huron and Ontario Ship Canal schemes, the electors of Russell need hardly be told that I would give my vote to the former, notwithstanding the opposition of the latter, and in doing so I shall exert myself to do my best to prevent any final settlement of this question that does not include a fair adjustment to all the municipalities not indebted to the fund.

The encouragement of agriculture and the promotion of immigration shall receive every consideration at my hands, and I shall willingly assent to the carrying through of such legislation as may be necessary, as it may seem expedient to promote.

The monies borrowed by municipalities from the Municipal Loan Fund, will probably at some future time be assumed by the Government as a Provincial debt, and a great deal depends on members from Eastern constituencies which have not been born, whether they shall get an equivalent. Still, I shall exert myself to do my best to prevent any final settlement of this question that does not include a fair adjustment to all the municipalities not indebted to the fund.

I would oppose all unnecessary expenditure. In a young country like ours we should study economy. But at the same time I would not advocate the meanness of not paying a fair salary for a fair amount of work. Having been brought up in this country, I am altogether Canadian in my feelings, and I wish to see all men proud of the name, who have made our country their home. I can heartily exhort the sons of fellowship, from what land they hail, for what sect of Christians they belong, I have won personal friends amongst all sects, and hope I will always be able, by a manly and straightforward course, to command the respect of all, whether friends or opponents.
