AMERICAN TAXATION.

The following exhibit of the financial dilemma of this State and the country, and of tion, was recently presented by a Republican member of the New York State Assembly : Can it do any harm to remember that our national debt is twenty-seven thousand millions of dollars? Of this, at least one-sixth, 12 or four hundred and nifty millions, must be 12 paid by this State. The State is now paying 10 to the national Government not less than seventy or eighty millions of dollars a year in direct taxes. The State debt is over fifty-one millions of dollars, and the town and county debts seventy-five millions more. In view o of our share of the national debt, the State 2 debt fails to impress us as it ought. Years ago, a State debt of forty millions startled the people; and the watchword went forth, stop and pay. On this very day New York is bound for five hundred and seventy-six millions of dollars of debt; more than one-third 2 of its whole assessed valuation. Our people 2 must pay the interest on this amount, and must provide for the redemption of the principal. The debt is wholly by reason of the cause for which it was incurred, and the peo-ple accept it as a debt of honor in the highest comes out of their earning and their savings, and the principal must one day increase their labors or diminish their comforts. This is no distant danger. The fact stares us in the face that we have entered upon the era of reduction of values.
