IN COUNCIL. August 1, 1867.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Session of the Parliament of the late Province of Canada, holden on the 29th and 30th years of her Majesty's reign, intituled: "An Act to amend the Acts respecting duties of Excise and to alter the duty thereby imposed on Spirits," it is among other things enacted (Sec. 9).

"The Governor in Council may in his discretion authorize the manufacture in bond of such dutiable goods as he may from time to time see fit to designate, in the manufacture or production whereof spirits or other articles subject to duties of Customs or Excise are used, by persons licensed to that effect, and subject to he provisions hereinafter made, and to the regulations to be made by the Governor in Council in that behalf, and the goods o manufactured in bonds shall, if taken out of bond for consumption in this Province, be subject Montreal and Hamilton, calling at all Intermediate to duties of Excise equal to the duties of Customs to which they would then be subject if imported from British or Foreign markets, and entered for consumption in this Province."


