In one of the tenements in Ashfield's row on the flats there are, as we are informed, three cases of fever, which tew would hesitate in ascribing to a piece of ground near the row, which is kept constantly wet from the drainage of a marsh between Ashfield's row and the Big Bay. It would cost comparitively little to construct a drain to the Dukest, drain, which would answer the purpose of keeping the wet patch dry, and render the Ber locality healthy. At this period of the season when fevers usually prevail under such circumstances, it becomes highly important to remember the old adage that "an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure."
