The following proclamation has been issued by the National Roman Junta : ROME, Sept. 22, 1867.

"ROMANS: The Government of the Kingdom of Italy has adopted great-military precautions to prevent any violation of the international obligations. The contingencies against which such precautions have been taken have never entered into our calculations, and, faithful to our convictions, expressed in all our acts, we must decline all responsibility on this account But if the Italian Government opposes such

contingencies from regard to its obligations under the September Convention, we must confine ourselves to excluding all doubt as far as regards ourselves. Our duty cannot go beyond this.
