CITY COUNCIL.

A regular meeting of the city council was held last night. Present—Ald. Langford, Cunningham, Bangs, Bate, Robinson, Featherston, Abbott, Frib, Goulden, Gurdip, Traversy, Heny and Martineau. His Worship the Mayor being absent, Ald. Cunningham on motion took the chair.

The minutes were read and approved. A number of petitions were presented and referred to the proper authorities.

A communication from the Police Commission is recommending a Look-Up to be provided by the Corporation for the temporary detention of prisoners, instead of sending them to jail previous to their examination before the Police Magistrate. The communication was referred to a Special Committee.

A petition from Edward Mooney and others, praying further interference of the council for the removal of the military latrines from their present location on the edge of Cutbush, to the site of the old barracks, was read and referred to the Police Magistrate.

PARIS, Oct. 21.—No answer has yet been returned by the King of Italy to the ultimatum of the Austrian Government, which demands the evacuation of the Papal States, and the evacuation of the Pontifical territories.

FROM EUROPE. LONDON, Oct. 21.—Midnight—Official despatches from Paris announce that Italy has positively pledged herself to faithfully observe the provisions of the September treaty.

PARIS, Oct. 21.—The reports that Garibaldi has disappeared from the Island of Capri are reiterated and seem to meet with credence. It is certain that he is not at the position at the head of the Cabinet. He will be succeeded by Gen. Menabre. Some of the bands of insurgents still remain in the Papal States, and the evacuation is not as complete as was previously reported.
