Your obedient servant, There is just one defect, or rather w should say redundancy, in "Red Tape's" con clusion. By strictly following the above analogy the designation of members of the Local Legislatures would simply be " M. -member of the Legislature-not "M. P "L.," because the term "Provincial" is no part of the title of the body to which they be long. We readily admit that, dispensing with the middle letter, condemned by our correspondent's own argument, the designation he suggests would be strictly correcf: " Par-" liament," as he justly says, is the title of the body in which is comprised the three Estates, " Congress" of the body comprising the State and popular representatives, or the whole Legislative power of the Republic, and "Le-"gislature" obviously embraces the like powers in our several Provinces; hence the title M. L .- Member of the Legislature-is logically unimpeachable, though there are reasons why M. L. A. ought still to be preferred. It may fairly be argued that because Members of the Legislative Councils take M. L. C. Members of the Legislative Assemblies ought to take M. L. A., both being equally Members of the same Legislature, where the two Houses exist.
