YESTERDAY'S DESPATCHES.

Frightful Railroad Accident. MONTPELIER, Dec. 13 .- One of the most fearful accidents known in the annals of Vermont, transpired to-day, at what is known as Harlon Bridge, near Northfield, on the Vermont Central Railroad. The bridge was burned on Sunday last, and about one hundred men have been engaged in repairing the work for temporary use. Most of the employees were returning to work, in a passenger car, which was being backed up to the works, and by some forgetfulness the engineer proceeded with them at a rapid rate, and did not check the speed until too late, and then the car, with from 70 to 100 men, was backed off the abutment into the river below, a distance ot 60 feet. Fifteen men were killed instantly, and three or four others have since died. Many others were seriously injured. The men killed were among the most usefu! men in Vermont. It is believed that when the engineer wished to stop the train, the engine was beyond his control.

The Corporation of the City of Ottawa, in Council assembled, hereby enacts and ordains as fol-

To any part of the city east of Bank street, and vice versa, TWENTY-FIVE CENTS; and for each additional passenger, TWELVE-AND- A-HALF CEN 18. For the conveyance of one passenger from any of the Carters' Stands to any part of the City, or from one part of the City to another, (except as CENTS; if detained over fifteen minutes, and under thirty minutes, THIRTY-SEVEN-AND-A-HALF CENTS; Each additional passenger, 12;

2. That the following scale of charges is hereby established for the loading, unloading, and cartage of goods, wares, merchandise, firewood, and all other loading by licensed Carters within the city of Ottawa :

From the east side of the Canal Basin to any part of Upper Town east of Bank street, and vice west side and vice versa, FIFTEEN CENTS. From the east side of the Canal Basin to any part of Upper Town west of Bank street, and vice versa, TWENTY-FIVE CENTS; and from the west side, and vice verso, TWENTY CENTS.
