WEDNESDAY, DEC. 18, 1867.

Pursuant to adjournment the Council met at 10 o'clock, a.m.

Cowan, Morgan, and Smith, to draft a petition on behalf of Carleton County, to be presented to the Legislature of Ontario, praying that the Act intituled "An Act to impose a tax on dogs, and for the better protection of sheep in Upper Canada," be so amended as to leave it optional with each municipality to impose a special tax, and that said petition be placed in the hands of the local member for Carleton for presentation.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Smith, seconded by Mr. Berry, that the Clerk be authorized to notify the owners of certain real estates in the Montreal *Whitaker* and *OTTAWA TIMES* newspapers, that the county is prepared to redeem said real estates, to the amount of \$100,000, in full dollars, on application at the Treasurer's office.—Carried.
