A RECENT ISSUE of the Halifax Citizen alluding to the Confederation movement in Newfoundland, frankly admitted that the vote of the Legislature on the Address proved the existence of a disposition "to look the subject in the face." The Citizen then proceeds to argue that as it is the evident intention to press the Union of Newfoundland, there is very little hope of repeal for Nova Scotia; that formerly, guided partly by the moderate tone of the Ontario and Quebec papers, it had hoped that the movement of the "Nova Scotia party" would not be seriously opposed; but that now it is evidently the intention of the authorities at Ottawa and Downing-street, not only to hold Nova Scotia within the Union, but to bring the other Provinces into it also, and that consequently the question is forced upon the Nova Scotians sooner than they anticipated, and to the course they should pursue after the refusal of "repeal."
