More than this, we ask the member who assumes to be so very conscientious, how he can, after having taken mons, and thereby accepted the situation, even think of remaining away without resigning his seat. To do otherwise is little better than perjury, and those who would aid or abet him in such a course, must take the conseuences, and reconcile their consciences that they are doing right. The responsibility is a most grave one .- Halifax Express.

# BRITISH AGRICULTURE.

In Great Britain, of 56,964,260 acres, there were in 1867, 29,831,07 under cultivation, against 28,679,771 in 1866. Of white crops there were 31.1 per cent.; of green, 11.7; of bare fallow, 3.3; clover under rotation, 13.4; and permanent pasture, 40.5. The number of cattle was 4,993,034; of sheep, 28,919,101; and of pigs, 2,966,979. In Ireland the amount of land in permanent pasture is increasing : the number of cattle and pigs decreasing ; but there is an increase in the number of sheep.
