Hen. Mr. STEEVES agreed with his hoh order to get information from a person acquainted with printing and the prices that should be charged for work of this kind. From that information we came to the decision to allow the Queen's Printer \$1,500 for the work, which was a sum considerably in advance of the amount we would have had to pay if it had been done by the parties who had contracted for the public printing. If the contractors had done the work it would have cost \$1,247, but is order that there might be no complaint we agreed to recommend that

Hon, Mr. AIKENS would like to know whether the Queen's Brinter had agreed to accept this sum; if not it would place the ibrarian in the position of being responsible for the difference between \$2,000 and the amount proposed to be paid, while at the same time the committee acknowledge that he acted under a misapprehension of his authority. They ought to be extremely careful in adopting the report, if it placed the librarian in that position.
