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Mr. O'CONNOR moved the House into Committee on the Viagrovors Association Bill. Mr. MCKENZIE objected that the measure belonged properly to the next Legislature.

Mr. HOWLAND said he had been ill when the question was formerly before the Legislature, but had taken the earliest opportunity to enquire into the matter, and to find out what the company claimed the right to manufacture spirits, which was manifestly contrary to the intention of the Legislature.

Mr. O'CONNOR asked the Minister to reply to the Minister of Inland Revenue. That gentleman had said that the association was about establishing a distillery. Such was not the case, and no one authorized to speak for the company had ever made such a statement.

Mr. HOWLAND explained that in November last, he had obtained the information, but from no secret source, that the company claimed the right to manufacture spirits. He had now made some further remarks in reply to the member for Essex, and the motion was allowed to stand.

Mr. SHANLY, who asked whether any report had been made by the Privy Council on the subject of the proposed measure for the alteration of the law relating to the duties on spirits, as it lays the question before us.

Mr. FORTIN, who asked whether it is the intention of the Government to grant a licence to the De Salaberry family, and recognizing the important services rendered to the Province by the late Col. De Salaberry, more than any other person, contributed to preserve to Great Britain the possession of the Colony on this Continent, and to maintain the integrity of the Province, which now forms part of the Canadian Confederation.

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
