He is a young man of respectable appearance and address, and stood in that dock the second time on a charge of larceny, having been tried and found guilty at the Spring Assizes, 1867, of a like offence, for which he had just completed a term of twelve months' imprisonment. He was arraigned for a like offence and pleaded guilty. The circumstances of the case were rather

peculiar. He was discharged from L'Orignal jail on the 9th of May, having completed his term of 12 months' imprisonment for his first offence; he went on same day by boat to Montreal, and was seen there on that evening; on the night of the 14th the office of P. O'Brian, Esq., in the Court House, adjoiring the jail, was entered, his vault opened and about \$290 in bank bills stolen. The robbery was discovered next morning. and Mr. O'Brian took some steps to discover the thief, but no clue was obtained. The suspicions of Mr. Dartnell, County Attorney, fell upon Black, and that he could be found in Quebec on the 16th. Instructions were given that if Black should turn up in the adjacent country he should at once be arrest-He was recognized at Hawkesbury village on the afternoon of Tuesday 19th, at the terrors of this frightful torture. once arrested and brought to L'Orignal. ## CHINESE MODE OF TORTURE.

The torture of the bedstead is resorted in order to extort money. The victim is put on a wooden rack-flat on his back-and his neck, wrists, and ankles are fastened down by boards having curves large enough for the purpose. These instruments are pressed down on the parts of the body to which they are fitted, and are then tied under the bedstead. The torture called "the monkey grasping a peach," is employed by Mandarins to compel a prisoner to confess his guilt. The weight of the body is wholly sustained by one arm, which is placed over a slender horizon-tal pole several feet from the earth, while the other arm, and this, are passed under the legs and tied together by the thumbs below the knees. The torture of the tub is caused by putting a large tub of bamboo, or a small tub or pail, turned bottom side up, upon the head of the culprit; incense is then lighted and placed so that the smoke shall ascend into the prisoner's head-cover.
