On the recommendation of the Hon. the Minister of Customs, and under the authority of the Hon. the Minister of Finance, the following regulation is hereby issued.

2 The \$16 for each officer, the \$8 for the commissioned officer and private, and the \$10 for each horse of the mounted officers and men of mounted drill companies, will be paid on the presentation of the certificate of the Commanding Officer of the battalion.

3 The allowance in lieu of transport for a horse in a bulk sum at the end of the month, and paid to the Captain of the mounted officers, will be paid on the presentation of the certificate of the Commanding Officer of the battalion.

4 The mileage, salaries, and all other expenses incurred by the volunteers as above, shall be defrayed by themselves, out of the annual contributions.

5 It must be distinctly understood, by all concerned, that the corps who may be organized themselves of their own accord, for the purpose of improving their drill, must do so before the 1st of October next.
