Speech of Horace Greeley before the Corn Exchange Association. Special to THE TIMES.

MONTREAL, December 17. Mr. Greeley was introduced to the Corn Exchange Association this afternoon by the President, who said he had been asked to bring Mr. Greeley, so that they might explain to him their position and views. The gen- India. The tood crops are deficient, and the tlemen present were all corn merchants, whose business it was to dispose of the produce of Western Canada, and were, therefore, all interested in the customs regulations in force on the border. Mr. Greeley, the Prestdent said, might see on the tables samples of figur from American wheat manufactured in the Western States, which was allowed to come in here free of duty, and offered beside four manufactured at our own mills. He though a miller, was quite satisfied that it should be so, but our neighours in the Eastern States, were somewhat particular, and wished a better quality than could be manufactured from wheat raised in the Western States, and when we wished to supply them with such four we had to pay a duty of \$1.20 persbarrel, in addition to freight and charges. 
