# E. M. MACDONALD AND THE CONCES.

No ir an in Nova Scotia has a fuller knowledge of everything pertaining to the various phases of the anti-Confederation agitation in that Province than E. M. Macdonald, editor of the Citizen, Dominion member for Lunenburg. Next to Mr. Howe, Mr. Macdonald rendered to the anti-Confederate cause in N. S. the chief oratorical service. Knowing this to be the case, we were anxious to see in what terms Mr. Macdonald would comment on Mr. Howe's 10 address to the men of Hants. In the Citizen of the 11th inst, that address is referred to. The Citizen says :
