TORONTO.

Tuesday, February 27.

The jail board of the city council met yesterday to receive the tenders for the jail supplies. It has been the custom to keep a van and a span of horses for the conveyance of prisoners between the jail and the police court, the driver of which is paid \$400 a year; the tendered offer to do all the work for \$250.

The finance committee also met, and resolved to consider the whole city finances at an early day. It appears the city is paying seven per cent. on discounts at the Bank of Toronto, whilst it receives nothing on the amount of its deposits, which is about one and four per cent. on the sinking fund.

The delegation from the Toronto, Grey and Bruce railroads up the country has succeeded in inducing the councilmen, Luther and Arthur to agree to submit to the voters grants-in-aid, as it is understood the building of the line depends on the granting of bonds.

Mr. Hooker, one of the Ottawa revivalists, is to preach here to-morrow evening.

The trains still continue irregular, though now have fallen for the last twenty-four hours.

MONTREAL.

Montreal, February 27.

At the Alexander snow-shoe races this afternoon the Hamilton, Ont., team was led by Maitby in 14 minutes 9 seconds; Robinson second. Harper did not compete. The club cup was won by Harry Jones in 15 minutes and 6 seconds. Kerouette came in first, and Thomas second in the Indian races.

Judgment was given to-day in the Superior Court by Justice Monk in the case of the Toronto, Grey and Bruce Railroad Assurance Company. The action was directed against Joe Hickson, Esq., Secretary of the Grand Trunk Railroad, and Mr. Wright, left for England last evening. Mr. Wallis will act as Secretary during Mr. Hickson's absence.

The Richmond understands that Hon. A. T. Galt will in a few days enter the Dominion Ministry, probably as Minister of Indian Revenue.

A fearful snow storm has been raging all day. The trains are all blocked up.

The drill shed has been turned into a veloci-pede ring. Six sinks are now in full blast in the city.

A woman named Corbell died suddenly this morning. An inquest was held at which the coroner just returned a verdict of died from "syncope."

A petition is being extensively signed in this city for the repeal of the Bankrupt Act, which it is said, is greatly abused.

The City Bank, also the National Express Company, certify that \$203,000 in silver coin has been exchanged by Mr. Weir since the 25th of last January.

There is a rumour here that Chapais is about to resign his seat in the Dominion Cabinet, and that he will be succeeded by Blanchet, Speaker of the Quebec Assembly.

A telegram was received this forenoon from Bradon, Vt., which states that the New York train, with the passengers for Montreal, ran off the track near the village of Bradon this morning, and a sleeping car was precipitated over a 25 foot embankment, and four or five passengers were seriously injured. The passengers in the forward car rendered good service in extricating their fellow-travellers from the sleeping car. The accident was caused by a telegraph wire, among those injured were Gen. Averill, Lieut. Fitzgeorge, and Mr. McLaren of Montreal.

## CABLE NEWS.

GREAT BRITAIN.

London, February 26.—In the case of Sawin vs. Starr, in the trial of which exposures were made of the conduct of the Bank of England, the verdict was today rendered for the plaintiff, who is awarded damages to the amount of £300.

The War Office has received official despatches from New Zealand announcing further successes over the rebels. The troops have carried by assault the Mori stronghold of Noyotippe, and have made a desperate defence, and lost two hundred killed and wounded, while the British lost twenty-two.

FRANCE.

PARIS, February 26.—In the Corps Legislatif to-day M. Roubier, Minister of State, acknowledged that though he had delayed the experiments in the improvements in the public service, he had taken care to see that they were carried out in strict accordance with the law, as far as was possible.

Paris, February 27.—In the Corps Legislatif yesterday M. Roubier, after defending the conduct of the Minister of State, introduced a bill authorizing direct loans for the improvement of Paris. Subsequently, in a speech, M. Roubier referred to the inconstancy of the Government having control of a part of the financial societies, and intimated that the Government would probably introduce a bill to abolish such control.

PRUSSIA.

BERLIN, February 27.—The Prussian Diet proposes to grant 2,000,000 florins to the municipality of Frankfort, to which the King will add a million from his private purse, in the hope that such action will draw closer to the monarchy and crown the hearts of the inhabitants of that city.

SPAIN.

Members of the Late Provisional Government to Retain their Seats in the Cortes.

MADRID, February 27.—During the session of the constituent Cortes last evening Prime Minister Marshal Serrano said that notwithstanding the retirement of the late Provisional Government, he intended to retain his seat, and would still retain their seats in the Cortes.

He stated further that the policy of the Government would be to follow the programme which the revolution had established. Every effort would be made to disarm the attack of the Republicans by reducing expenditures in all quarters, and pursuing a liberal policy generally. He added that the liberal reforms which had been contemplated for Cuba had been necessarily postponed by reason of the insurrection there.

GREECE.

Re-establishment of Friendly Relations between Greece and Turkey.

ATHENS, February 27.—The Greek Government has officially announced the re-establishment of friendly relations with Turkey.
