OTTAWA, March 10.—The Bishop of Ontario arrived here yesterday, and is staying at the "Queen's" hotel.

Lord Alexander Balfour, Major-General Bissett and S. Morland, of Montreal, arrived here to-day, and are staying at the Rossin House.

The deputation of the directors of the Toronto Nipissing, which left on Thursday, have been since holding meetings in Scott and Brock. The result seems satisfactory, as Brock has passed a by-law granting \$50,000 to the line. It was carried yesterday by a majority of 164.

The Board of Trade held a meeting last night, and considered the amendments to the Act of Incorporation, and the trade to the Red River. Nothing definite was done on the latter point.

A special Cabinet meeting is called for

tomorrow at noon. A number of nominations

for foreign missions will be submitted,

and then sent to the Senate. Washburn goes

to France; Bancroft will remain at Berlin;

Motley will be returned to Austria; and Gov.

Curtis will be offered the mission to Russia

or Italy. No one has been fixed upon yet for the mission to England. Several prominent persons are suggested, but Gen. Grant to-day had not decided upon the one whom he should select. General Schofield will probably retire to-morrow. He will be appointed to-morrow, and Gen. Rawlins will be appointed in his place, if he will accept it.

The *Sun's* special says there is a movement on foot to-night, with its headquarters near the Ebbitt House, to try and change Gen. Grant's intention of nominating Governor Bowditch. It has not been learned who they are for, but they are going to make him out again if it is possible to do so. Mr. Stewart does not favor Mr. Bowditch, and it is certain that unless he will be appointed, and himself has no official knowledge of the President's intention to nominate him.
