But, on the other hand, it is of vital importance that the incorporation of the Red River Settlement should not be delayed by a tedious lawsuit with a gigantic monopoly. A few years more of suspense would Americanize the whole colony, and the grand prospect of a continuous line of civilized territory, from the Atlantic to the Pacific, would disappear forever.

Looking at the present arrangement from all points of view, therefore, it seems not the best that could be made, to be at least the best possible under the existing circumstances. So far as the company is concerned it is simply generous—generous indeed, that it has been rejected now, it would never have been renewed. Regarding Canada, it may be said, that almost any feasible arrangement was preferable to the endless litigation that had been rendered inevitable. As it is, all that now remains is for the Canadians to push forward as rapidly as possible these great public works, which are to connect the Dominion with its new purchase.

Whether the Minister of Public Works is prepared to exchange his portfolio to accommodate the member for Lambton, is a question that cannot be decided, but the very fact that Mr. McKenna's principal complaint against the Government is that there are too few Reformers in the Cabinet, points to such a solution of the difficulty as that indicated by the Herald. Were he to come in by some such arrangement, he would count for two ordinary Reformers, and put an effective check on the selfish schemes of these plotting "Conservatives."

The correspondence between the Government and the Great Western Railway Company, concerning the settlement of the Company's indebtedness, which was laid before Parliament by the Hon. Minister of Finance, with the statement of account, etc., brought out a very interesting and important question, which is being discussed in a pamphlet of thirty-six pages. The correspondence commences on the 1st June and closes on the 31st March last. A perusal of it will show that the Hon. Mr. Ross had a tedious and most difficult negotiation to complete; that he resented with becoming spirit the unfair insinuations cast upon the Canadian Government by the President of the Company in England, which at the same time avoided any harsh or ungenerous treatment towards the Company itself.
