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SAN HILDEBRAND. The Outlaw of the Southwest—A Reward of \$10,000 OFF. for His Head.—Description of the Bold and Desperate of Modern Times.

The good people of Washington and St. Francis have for several years kept in awe by the bold and bloody acts of the notorious Sam Hildebrand, this man, it is said, has murdered at least fifty persons in those counties and Arkansas.

It is probable that this large amount will induce men of nerve and shrewdness to undertake his capture; but it is generally believed that Hildebrand will never be taken alive. He knows that he will receive no mercy at the hands of the law, and that his capture will result in ignominious death.

Hildebrand is six feet one inch in height; sandy complexion; broad rather thin; dark eyes; keen blue eyes; on each side of his face he has a furred or blood-vein colored spot the size of half a dollar; hawk nose; small mouth; feminine voice; light, thin hair; aged about fifty-five years; weight about 170 pounds; walks erect, carries his head back. Has, when last seen, a brown buttoned coat, an old pair of shoes, black slouch hat. Had a scar on one of his legs, caused by a shot passing through the calf and coming out below the knee.

His Excellency the Governor General in Council. Whereas it is enacted by the 3rd section of the 33rd Statute of the 1st Vic. Cap. 8, intituled: "AN Act respecting the Inland Revenue," that "any use made of any Kilns, Cochrane, Malt-floor, or kiln for the steeping, germinating or drying of any grain shall be a working of a Malt-house and acting as a Maltster" within the meaning of that Act.

It is the duty of the Officer to examine closely and ascertain whether the damaged grain is germinating, and if it be, to report the same to the Collector forthwith.

1st. The period for drying damaged grain shall in each case be regulated by the Collector of Inland Revenue; 2nd. The drying shall be done under the personal inspection of the Officer of Excise, detailed for that purpose;

3rd. The Owner of the grain or drying kiln shall pay to the Collector of Inland Revenue such sum as shall be sufficient to cover the expense incurred in the survey of drying damaged grain;

4th. It will be the duty of the Officer to examine closely and ascertain whether the damaged grain is germinating, and if it be, to report the same to the Collector forthwith.
