CONDITION OF THE CROPS IN THE UNITED STATES.

The Statistician of the Department of Agriculture has just submitted to Commissioner Capron the regular monthly report of the condition of growing crops. The min-fall during June was in excess of that of the corresponding period of last year, except in Paris, Florida, along the Atlantic coast, between Washington and New York City, and to a slight degree in Rhode Island, New Hampshire, and Minnesota. The greatest disparity existed in the wheat belt between the Missouri and the Mississippi Rivers.
