His preparations, I repeat, were only portions of the body, whereas that which is now being exhibited in Naples, in the ex-convent of Santa Maria della Nuova, is the entire body of a youth of seventeen years of age. died of phthisis about the end of January. For five months, therefore, has resist d the action of a very variable atmosphere. The features, the integrity of the form, are perfectly preserved as they were at the moment of death. The nails have a roseate hue; there is no odor of any kind and the flesh has the hardness almost marble. To this let it be added, that hair adheres so tenaciously to the head that it is impossible to remove it of course, without violence.
