CHESTNUT TO ANIMALS AGAIN.—On Saturday night a baker's horse and cart were going along Sparks street, opposite Hope's corner, the poor jade found it impossible to go another step and fell down in the mud. Notwithstanding the feeble and helpless condition of the poor beast, he was the subject of much cruel abuse because he was unable to get up. Finding that blows and curses failed to give him strength to rise, his harness was taken off, and he was allowed to lie unattended in the mire. He lay there for an hour or two, surrounded by a mixed crowd of idlers and sympathizers, whose coarse jokes and maledictions on the torturers of dumb animals attracted so much of the horse's attention that he found it impossible to take a quiet nap which he seemed to require. Some on thought of offering him something to eat, and when by such a apple, piece of oat or bread, or a handful of oats, for his many friends brought him each in turn, his desire to sleep forsook him, and he appeared quite lively, and willing to take a new lease of life. We left the victim of starvation and hard work at about ten o'clock, and did not see him afterwards. The poor creature belonged to a baker on King-st.

PASSENGER.—A man named Morrison was charged with assaulting a boy on the public street. Morrison, in his defence, declared that he did not know the boy, and had never seen him before, so that he could have had no motive for assaulting him. He said that he was passing along the street when the boy ran out of some place and caught the motion of his hand on his face, but it was perfectly accidental. The boy himself was of opinion that the assault was intentional.

Pierre Leblanc was charged with selling liquor on Sunday. Case adjourned till Monday.

John Donahoe was charged with selling liquor without license, and fined \$20 and costs.

Mary Ann Campana was charged with selling liquor without license, but she did not appear.

Hugh Fraser said he got liquor at the house of defendant on Sunday last, but it was outside, and he paid for it on Saturday night.

Alexis Ambrosio was called for the prosecution, but he professed entire ignorance as to the whereabouts of Mary Ann.

Charles Gravelle was charged with an infringement of the liquor law. Case adjourned till Monday.

Mr. Beaucourt was charged with selling liquor on Sunday, and Alexis Ambrosio was called for the defence. The witness said he went into Beaucourt's charge. On Friday last

and asked his clerk for a drink. Mr. Beaucourt was sitting asleep in the room at the time, and he waked him and asked if he could have a drink. He got permission, and put down ten cents, and asked for five cents change, because that being all the money he had, the change would be useful when he should require another drink. Witness is a shanty-man, and works on the river as long as there is anything to be done. Then he works in the city. Fined \$20 and costs.

Robert Hamilton, selling liquor on Sunday. John Levan was the only witness called. He said he was there last Sunday, and called for a glass of gin, and drank it as gin, but he would not swear that it was gin.

A young lad was charged with taking two bottles of scotch from the premises of Mr. Russell. He elected to be tried summarily, and was sent to jail for six hours.

THE LATE MURDER IN OSOODEE.

The circumstance of John Shaw having been arrested on suspicion of knowing something of his late father's murder, and the supposition that he would be up for examination before the Police Magistrate on Saturday morning, brought a number of people there in the expectation of seeing him. He was not examined, however, nor was he brought up to the court, so those who came to see him were disappointed.

The prisoner had been in the cells all night, and we believe had slept well; indeed he was sleeping soundly in a short time after he arrived at the station. In the morning he was allowed to come out of the cell into the station room, to get his breakfast, where, to those who saw him, he appeared quite as unconcerned as any one present, and seemed to manifest far less feeling than would be expected from any one whose father had so recently died, even unattended by such horrible circumstances, the bare recital of which have so much shocked the community.

It is sincerely to be hoped, for the honour of humanity, however, that it will not turn out to be a parricide. Without this damning crime the deed is sufficiently horrible, and yet there are circumstances which seem to justify the arrest, not only of John Shaw, but of other members of the family also, for suspicion seems to rest upon them, and they should have an opportunity of proving that they are innocent, if they are so. We have heard disinterested persons express an opinion, however, that there is good reason to go out of the family in quest of the person who fired the gun. We are glad to find that a very necessary step was taken on Saturday to supply a defect in the proceedings at the Coroner's Inquest. The authorities had neglected to have a medical man on hand to make a post mortem examination of the body. It was of course necessary that this should be done in order that proper proof should be furnished, that the deceased came to his death by a gun shot wound. The necessity for this was seen on Saturday morning, and accordingly Dr. A. Godd of this city was summoned to perform that duty. The result is as follows:

The deceased, Thomas Shaw, was a stout, able-bodied man, of about 35 years of age, of the medium height, and up to the time of his death was enjoying good health.

Upon examination it was found that the bullet had entered a little to the right of the protuberance of the occipital bone—at the back of the skull—passing forwards and upwards, through that part of the brain called the cerebellum, and continuing its course through the middle lobe of the cerebrum, making its exit at the posterior superior angle of the parietal bone on the right side. The bones through which the ball passed were fractured into several pieces, and at the union of the bones at the top of the skull a large piece was blown completely out. The brain itself was very much lacerated, and a considerable amount was forced from the cranium by the passage of the bullet. The integuments were also torn in almost every direction, the whole presenting the most frightful mutilation that is possible to imagine. Death was almost instantaneous.

SALE OF DUNDURR CASTLE.—The New Scotchman, a FINE FACTORY.—The rumour mentioned of the sale of Dundurr Castle and grounds is fully confirmed, and the handsome property has already changed hands. The purchaser are these gentlemen: Messrs. James Southern, James and the price paid was \$25,000, a mere fraction of the original cost of the buildings alone. The grounds comprise twenty-five acres, and are the most beautiful and highly improved to be found in this part of the Dominion, abounding in romantic glens, shady rambles, and include an unlimited amount of choice fruit trees and rare shrubbery. The design of the new proprietor is to put up a first class summer hotel, for the special accommodation of tourists from the States. The plans are already prepared, and provide for the addition of two stories to the present castle, making the building four stories in height, and the erection of two extensive wings, the accommodations of the hotel, when complete, will be sufficient for two hundred families. Other important improvements are contemplated, among which may be mentioned the erection of a bridge leading over the track of the Great Western Railway in the rear, and a stairway to the shore of the bay, for the convenience of boating parties. A wharf, to permit the landing of steamers, will also be constructed. In short, this magnificent property is now in the hands of parties who will render it one of the most attractive resorts in the Dominion, and a real substantial benefit to the city.
