

Fenian Prisoners.

NEW YORK, October 21 .- A special to the Post, from Washington, says measures are to be taken at once, by the Government authorities, to obtain the release of the six American citizens incarcerated in British prisons, for alleged complicity in the Fenian movement. Some correspondence has already taken place between Secretary Fish and Mr. Gladstone in relation to this question, but as vet no positive request has been made for the release of the prisoners. During an interview last evening the President said that the course which the British Government pursued was not complimentary or courteous to the United States, but he believed that when they understood that this Government intends to insist upon protecting all its citizens a more liberal spirit would prevail, and those now held in confinement would be released.
