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SIR FRANCIS HINCKES

In the Past and in the Present. To the Editor of THE TIMES. Sir, I find in my portfolio an unpublished letter which many years back, but as I believe, equally applicable to-day as then. It has become the fashion to take up old stories, so that perhaps mine may go with the others. Here it is:

That luminous statesman, Mr. Fox, once said that 'the blessings which men owe to their country are beyond the reach of the event to describe.' But if the liberty of the press be, what I firmly believe it is, that political blessing which includes all others, or that which, without which all others become curio; how much does it owe to those who perceive and feel its value, to use every means which virtue and good sense can suggest to preserve it from the attacks which vindictive, rather than party views, has late inflicted upon public feeling.

I have, for some time past, been a close student of the management of the press. A portion of the press can be exerted to influence public opinion against the acts or presumed measures of any prominent or responsible member of the administration of Government, and I must confess to regret that after sharing for upwards of a quarter of a century, in all the turmoil incident to popular government, I have never appeared to have made such a purposeful use of the press as a means of effecting this purpose as the Globe.
