Caldwell Remanded back to Jail-Special to THE TIMES. MONTREAL, December 9.

Caldwell, one of the parties charged with drawback frauds in the New York Customs acquainted with the little strifes and misun-derstandings of their respective localities was greatly in favour of the change. He was opposed to the appointment of clergymen as Superintendents, because they had enough to do in attending to their own duties.
