WRECK AND LOSS OF LIFE .- The schooner Annie, of Pictou, N. S., from Halifax for Liv. erpool, ran ashore on the 22ud uit, on the eastern head of the entrance to Liverpool harbor, and became a total wreck. The captain mistook a light in a dwelling house for that on the point, and in the darkners the accident occurred. A passenger named Mullins, belonging to Guysboro' County, on a visit to his friends, and one of the crew, a Frenchman, were washed overboard and drowned; and a son of the captain was also washed overboard, but escaped with some severe bruises, being thrown up on the rocks by the waves. A boat, manned by three intrepid young men, put off and rescued Captain Wooden and the rest of the crew, at the peril of their own lives. The vessel and cargo were totally lost. Captain Wooden has been going to sea for 40 years. and this is the first serious accident he has ever met with.
