PRESIDENT LINCOLN. Contemplated Suicide in the dark days of the war.

We always had a liking for "Father Abraham" when he was at the White House. His honest, and genial nature was apparent to everybody who knew anything of him. He was the immediate cause of a graet civil

war; but naturally he was one of the least warlike of men. Sometimes, like others, we NEW CLAN TARTAN GALA Plaids, wide, thought his abounding humour cropped out at the wrong time and place. The story given below shews, however, that Mr. Lincoln was susceptible of the deepest and gravest feelings; it shews, also, how at times nearly hopeless, in the judgment of the best informed Northern men was the cause of the Union in the late struggle.

(Washington Correspondence Philadelia Post.) Mr. Stanton said it pained him to see the opinion so prevalent that Mr. Lincoln wasan habitual joker, and never serious. He said it was a great error, and related the following incident to prove the injustice of the popular impression; Mr. Lincoln was very sensitive of the criticisms of the newspaper press, trate opened the examination in this case believing it, he asserted, the true voice of the people.
